

DESCENDANTS OF HENRY de APULDREFIELD

Generation 1

Henry de Apuldrefield, b. ca. 1147; 2 Richard (Lionheart) I (1189-1199) at Siege of Acre [Aug 28, 1189-July 12, 1191] in Palestine.; marr. Unk; ISSUE: Henry (he also was at Siege of Acre with his father)

Generation 2

Henry de Apuldrefield, b. ca. 1168; marr. Unk; ISSUE: 1. **Henry** 2. William

Generation 3

Henry de Apuldrefield of Apulderfield in Cudham bef. 14 Hen. III, 1230; b. ca. 1189; marr. Unk; ISSUE: 1. **William** 2. Henry

Notes: Henry was in Gascony with Henry III in 1230 per Roll of Gascony. (Ref #1 below, p.4)

Generation 4

William de Apuldrefield of Otterpley in Challock bef. 14 Hen III (1230); b. ca.1210; marr. Unk; ISSUE: 1. Henry (living 1243-4 to 42 & 1257-8; marr. Lettice MNU;

Generation 5

Henry de Apuldrefield; living 1292-3; d. by 1295-6; marr. Joan MNU (held Otterpley in dower & living 1270-1);

ISSUE: 1. **John** 2. Henry (Curate of Chatham & Cannon of Leeds Monastery 1315-6 also Abbot of ?)

Generation 6

John de Apuldrefield of Otterpley; living 1324; d. by 1326-7; marr. Joan MNU (had Otterpley fro life by 1326-7) ISSUE: 1. John 2. Henry 3. **Agnes**

Generation 7

Agnes de Apuldrefield; marr. Richard Denne, of Denne Hall, Kingston (See [Denne Family](#))

NOTES:

1) This ancient family is descended **from Henry de Apuldrefield of Apuldrefield in Coudham/Cowdham** who, with other Kentish gentlemen, fought with King Richard I [Lionheart 1189-1199] at the Siege of Acre [Aug 28, 1189-July 12, 1191] in Palestine. 3) "**Henry de Apulderfield** of Apulderfield in Coudham/Cowdham, now contractedly called Apulderfield, ... was Sheriff [1272-1307] . [Thomas Philipott ~Villare Cantianum, 2nd Edition" by King's Lynn, 1776

4) "England's Topographer: A New & Complete History of the County of Kent.." by Wm. H. Ireland (google ebook) p. 548 - "Otterpley is a manor in this district...the mansion no longer stands; the site & demesnes, which lay near Eastwell ... which was formerly called Aperfield's garden. This was one of the seats belonging to the ancient family of the Apulderfield's, otherwise Apperfield. **Henry de Apulderfield** resided at Apulderfield, in Cowdham & was possessed of this property under (1216-1272), & his **descendant, Henry**, held it in the reign of Edward III (1327-1377).

5) "Challock, in the hundred of Calehill, hath two places in it....first is Otterpley, which is an eminent seat belonging to the ancient family of Apulderfield. The first...too have possessed it, was Henry de Apulderfield, who had the grant of a market & fair to his manor of Apulderfield in Coldham [sic] (Cowdham), in the 38th year of Henry III (1216-1272) & this man's **great grandchild Henry de Apulderfield** was Sheriff of Kent ... (1327-1377), & held his shrievalty[sic] at Challock. His house was near Eastwell in the Earl of Winchelsey's upper park, called Apulderfields garden which is so obscured in its own ruins, that we now with difficulty trace out its sepulcher, made up of its own complicated rubbish, but this manor, as to some proportion of it was passed away before he was sheriff, to Edmund de Haut....
